What is FRI?

FRI is a strategic intermediary organization that supports frontline communities.

We do this through direct funding and by acting as a comprehensive resource hub that creates avenues for shared learning and community building as well as providing opportunities for technical assistance and organizational support.

FRI fosters movement building through a broad constellation of efforts toward systemic change across the geographic and organizational spectrum. We adapt and grow according to the dynamic landscape of environmental and climate justice needs of frontline communities.



What does FRI do?

Frontline groups need comprehensive support that meets each community's unique needs and priorities – and extends beyond an individual grant cycle. Despite a long history of successful organizing, many organizations working to address environmental injustices do not have sufficient resources and adequate funding opportunities.

FRI is part of a growing effort to address these gaps.

The Conceptual Committee

FRI's purpose, vision, and values are guided by its Conceptual Committee. The Conceptual Committee is a select group of 11 environmental and climate justice leaders, independent of FRI and EDF, who live in and serve frontline communities and Indigenous tribes and nations. Specifically, FRI...

FUNDS frontline groups to support organizational needs (e.g., strategic planning, staff salaries and benefits).

SHARES and develops resources – including technical tools, best practices, and scientific expertise – to create a system of support for frontline groups.

CONVENES a network of frontline groups to identify opportunities and challenges and share movement-building lessons and knowledge.



CONNECTS frontline groups to resource and assistance providers who can provide readily available and accessible tools, training, and expertise.



EVOLVES by examining gaps and needs of frontline groups from around the world to provide dynamic tools and resources that fit the needs of each group.

Introducing the Inaugural FRI Grantee Cohort

FRI places its highest funding priorities on addressing the needs of community-led, frontline environmental and climate justice organizations.

In 2022, FRI released two grant opportunities intended to bolster frontline groups in building organizational capacity, developing strategies, and promoting shared learning between grant recipients and the wider environmental and climate justice resource network. Funding was issued in two tracks: one focused on organizational strategy development and the second focused on flexible funding for organizational capacity. The intent of these tracks is to allow grantees to take a step back from day-to-day mission-based activities and create space to strategize, grow, and build a strong organizational foundation.

FRI, EDF staff, and consultants perform a screening round based on an organization's eligibility and authenticity as an environmental SCREENING ROUND and climate justice organization, in 314 Proposals accordance with the Tides Foundation's vision, mission, and values. Each application is reviewed by at least two SCORED ROUND individuals. Questions are scored based on 2xx Proposals criteria specific to each funding track. Top scores from both tracks move on to the Independent Advisory Committee (IAC) for review. IAC REVIEW Each IAC member reviews all top scorers for each track under the same criteria. The IAC uses a similar blind scoring process as the scored round, with additional financial and legal elements taken into consideration.

The Review Process

The Grantees

In March 2023, FRI announced its inaugural grantee cohort, including 13 frontline groups that represent nine states and U.S. territories and six EPA regions. Through our partnership with these organizations, FRI provides financial and technical support, a space for shared learning and networking, and tools for the grantees to build capacity and organizational strength. FRI also intends to convene its grantees to exchange and share knowledge and best practices, report progress, and provide feedback.

Resource Hub Spotlight

FRI's comprehensive resource hub is designed to consolidate movement-wide knowledge and create an accessible space for frontline groups across the world to create partnerships, link resources and best practices, and engage in shared learning to build an ecosystem of sustained collective action.

EPN's Suggested Application Processes for DOE and EPA Funding Opportunities

Our partners at the <u>Environmental Protection Network</u> (EPN) have put together suggested pre-application and application processes, respectively, for the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE) Energy Improvements in Rural or Remote Areas Program and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Great Lakes Community Environmental Justice Grant Programs.

EPN has been providing <u>pro-bono technical assistance</u> to environmental justice communities for the last two years. Their <u>550+ EPA alumni volunteers and their 6 (soon to be 10!)</u> <u>Community Outreach Associates</u> help disadvantaged communities, community-serving NGOs, and under-resourced state/local/Tribal agencies:

- navigate and understand government programs, data, and processes;
- gain access to partners, allies, and decision makers; and
- apply for funding.

EPN works on community-identified issues including petrochemicals, air quality, safe drinking water, brownfields redevelopment, Superfund cleanups, climate resilience, and more. To date, over 120 of their volunteers have provided pro bono assistance on over 300 technical assistance requests, and have assisted over 100 organizations registering for and/or applying for <u>federal funding</u>.

Supporting Communities to Reduce Lead Poisoning [CDC]

DEADLINE: July 31, 2023 FOR: Supports 10 community-based organizations working to mitigate risks of lead exposure through: 1) prevention education and 2) community engagement. AMOUNT: Up to \$200,000



Great Lakes Community Environmental Justice Grant Programs [EPA]

DEADLINE: August 11, 2023 **FOR:** Funds 1) projects in a particular region of the Great Lakes Basin and 2) projects across the entire Great Lakes Basin.

AMOUNT: \$10,000,000 - \$20,000,000 (Basin-wide applicants); \$2,000,000 -\$10,000,000 (Regional applicants) <u>Click here</u> to view Environmental Protection Network's suggested six-step application process!
